7:00 PM *Rare Plants of Ohio* – Andrew Lane Gibson, Ohio Department of Natural Resources Field Botanist, blogger, photographer

Andrew was born on the glaciated till plains of west-central Ohio, where he came to admire nature from a very young age. That early admiration has since blossomed into a calling to better understand and preserve our natural world. Gibson is a graduate of Hocking College where he studied wildlife management and biology before continuing his education in plant biology and ecology at Ohio University in Athens. He is currently a field botanist for the Ohio Division of Natural Areas and Preserves where he monitors, surveys, and manages state listed rare plants and habitats. Wild orchids are his most passionate botanical interest and area of research. He has seen nearly 80 of eastern North America's species and all 47 of Ohio's indigenous taxa. Gibson is an ardent photographer and writer and publishes a popular nature blog and Instagram, The Buckeye Botanist featuring his many botanical forays and travels.
